

TIME TO TALK

- **4** Are there things happening today which you believe need to change? How is the best way for you to express this belief?
- 5 The author tells us of the enormous popularity of 'Sweet Mother'. Can you think of a song that has the same level of popularity in British pop history? Is there a song currently that you think might be remembered in this way?

- **6** What makes a song memorable to you? What makes a song appeal to lots of people at once?
