TIME TO TALK

- 2 Noah and his Dad struggle to communicate when they see each other again after a while. Why do you think this is? Can you relate to this experience at all?
- **3** What's the best way to deal with an animal who is injured? What would you do in their situation?
- 4 'There are a million of them.
